Happy New Year!

I promised our Editor that my article would be a short one, and as a belated Christmas present to you all, it will be.

Section 202 of our National Bylaws was revised a few years ago to require that all Posts adopt Bylaws to govern Post business. For many years most Posts simply followed both the Department and National Bylaws. However, there are a number of "policies" that Posts follow that should be upgraded to a Bylaw. One example is the

committees necessary to promote Post and VFW programs. A second is to establish a time and place to conduct Post business.

At any rate, every Post needs to adopt their own Bylaws, and the National organization has developed a template for doing so. A copy of the template is available on the National website. Go to vfw.org and login with your username and password. Then click on My VFW, scroll down to Member/Post Resources and click on Bylaws: Training, Forms & Templates.

When using the Post Bylaws template, it is perfectly acceptable to modify it to fit your specific needs. However, modifications cannot conflict with the National or Department Bylaws. One modification might be to add or delete some of the listed standing committees. Another might be to add a section that allows the Post to develop an SOP (Standard Operating Policy or Procedure) that can be modified, without changing the Bylaws. If the Post runs a business, the Post Bylaws would likely establish a House Committee to formalize all kinds of business procedures and policies.

So, your 2025 New Year's resolution should be to carefully read Section 202 and to get your Post Bylaws approved, or if you have existing Bylaws, to review and revise them as necessary and forward them to the Department for review. After the Department's review, they will forward them to National HQ for final review and approval.

Hope to see you at the Mid-Winter Conference in February.

DONATIONS TO A 501c19 VETERANS ORGANIZATION

You may have heard about the recent passage of H.R.1432 "VSO Equal Tax Treatment Act", or the "VETT Act" concerning donations to Veterans' organizations. Prior to the passage of the VETT Act, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary (501c19), were eligible for charitable tax-deductible donations because we met the criteria under previous law. The basis was that at least 90 percent of the membership are people who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces during a period of war.

Donations made to a Post or Auxiliary are tax deductible. For tax purposes, all donations for \$250 or more must have written acknowledgment to substantiate a charitable contribution that must contain the following information:

- Name of the organization;
- Amount of cash contribution;
- Description (but not value) of non-cash contribution;
- Statement that no goods or services were provided by the organization, if that
- Description and good faith estimate of the value of goods or services, if any, that organization provided in return for the contribution; and
- Statement that goods or services, if any,

that the organization provided in return for the contribution consisted entirely of intangible religious benefits, if that was the case.

In addition, a donor may claim a deduction for contributions of cash, check, or other monetary gifts only if the donor maintains certain written records that can be clarified on the IRS website or by a tax professional.

Wreaths Across America for 2024









2025 Publication Guidelines for Candidates

Upon announcing their candidacy for VFW or Auxiliary elected office – whether new candidate or current office holder – those running for office are afforded one "free article" outlining their announcement and qualifications. Space is limited, so standard editing policies apply, with 450 words maximum. A "Dear Comrades" ("Dear Auxiliary Members") announcement letter format seems to work pretty well. Candidates must also supply one good quality "head and shoulders" .jpg photo electronic file for publication. Current "file photos" may be used as well. Publication of the "free article" is typically scheduled for the March issue, following the Mid-Winter Conference.

Candidates are then encouraged to purchase paid advertising in the Wisconsin VFW News at the *substantially discounted* VFW member rates currently in effect. *These ads typically publish in the March and/or May papers.*

- May 2025 paper deadline of April 4, 2025



THE BOOK CORNER

PEA SHOOTER PILOT

by John Robert 'Jim' Donohue

"I was a World War II fighter pilot. The bomber pilots called us "pea shooter pilots," we called them "truck drivers". But it was all in good fun, because we had a lot of respect for one another. I didn't envy them having to fly straight and level through flak and enemy fighters and they were always glad to have a fighter escort. We couldn't do anything about the flak, but we could take care of the enemy fighters."

PARK FALLS, Wisconsin — Our country's history is full of stories of everyday people doing extraordinary things. One of those stories is detailed in a newly released memoir, *Pea Shooter Pilot*. Author John Robert Donohue, "Jim" to his family and friends, details his experience in the Army Air Corps during World War II, including his efforts to enter the aviation cadet program, flight training, and flying P-38s in combat in the Pacific Theater.

Donohue was born in Oxbo, Wisconsin, on Christmas Day in 1922. He graduated from

Draper High School in 1941 and was working in a logging camp in Michigan on December 7 when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. He immediately enlisted in the Army and shipped out before the end of the year. "I didn't think about going to war," Donohue wrote. "This was a great adventure, and I was ready for whatever happened."

After basic training in Missouri, the Army sent Donohue criss-crossing the U.S., first to Ohio, then to Seattle and Alaska, and eventually to California where he attended flight school. After

He was married to his wife, Phyllis for nearly 60 years, and has two daughters, four grandchildren, one great-grandson, and two great-great-grandchildren. He is an avid outdoorsman with a keen sense of humor.

completing flight training, he was assigned to fighter squadrons in Hawaii and the Pacific Islands. He returned to Northern Wisconsin in December 1945 after the war ended.

Donohue began working on *Pea Shooter Pilot* in his mid-80s and shortly after finished the book and shared it with his family and friends. He recently self-published the book on **amazon.com**, where it is available as a paperback and an e-book.


In addition to his World War II

memoir, Donohue has also written a collection of poems that is included in *Pea Shooter Pilot*. It includes poems inspired by his time in the military, the people in his life, and the occasion of his birthday.

"They throw the word "hero" around pretty loosely these days. There's no doubt there were some real heroes, but I never considered myself one. I had to do something so I picked out the best thing I could think of. I

turned out to be pretty good at it, and I had fun."
