A little about me: I grew up in Beaver High School, joining the U.S. Marine

Dam and graduated from Beaver Dam Corps on June 6, 1989. After completing Basic Training in San Diego and Marine Combat Training at Camp Pendleton, California, I went on to Marine Aircraft Life Support System Technician (Parachute Rigger) School in Lakehurst, New Jersey. I then joined the Fleet Marine Force via Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 164, Marine Air Group 16, 3rd Marine Air Wing, Marine Corps Air Station Tustin, California, in

the Flight Equipment Shop. My first deployment was with the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) aboard the USS Okinawa LPH 3, June 1990 - April 1991. During that deployment, the 13th MEU(SOC) took part in all three phases of the 1st Gulf War: Desert Shield, Desert Storm, and Desert Saber. My second deployment was with the 15th MEU(SOC) aboard the USS Tripoli LPH 10, September 1992 - April 1993. We spearheaded Operation Restore Hope in the Country of Somalia.

Since being Honorably Discharged from active service on June 6, 1994, with the rank of Corporal, I have been teaching scuba diving for the past 30 years as a Master Scuba Diver Trainer. Working in numerous construction trades, most notably as an HVAC Technician, I am currently the Director of Facilities at Ripon College, overseeing the Maintenance, Housekeeping, and Grounds Departments.

2534 in Wisconsin Rapids, has been chosen to fill this role. This new position will help distribute Inspector tasks and prepare someone new for future consideration as Inspector.

We likely have a lot of new Commanders and Quartermasters this year, and the June Quarterly Audit needs to be completed and submitted to State Headquarters by the end of July. This report requires the signature of the Commander and Trustees elected for the 2025-2026 term. I appeal to outgoing Quartermasters to offer assistance to "boot camp" Quartermasters so their first tasks are completed correctly and on time.

Besides the June Audit, a couple of more tasks also need to be tackled as well. The Quartermaster Bond must be submitted to Headquarters to ensure it is in force by August 30. If your Post doesn't use the VFW for bonding, make sure you verify when your current Bond expires and renew it accordingly. When private bonding is used, a copy must be submitted to Dept. HQ.

By the time you read this, Post Quartermasters will again have access to the VFW Online Membership System (OMS). Access to and familiarity with the OMS is necessary to be an effective QM. In addition, the Troop ID (ID.Me) password used by the VFW is also accepted by the IRS to enter the site to file a 990 form.

And this leads to filing the IRS 990 form - essentially your Post's or District's nonprofit income tax form. If your fiscal year ends June 30, I advise submitting the report as soon as possible. If your fiscal year ends December 31, make sure the 990 has been filed, and if it has not been filed, do so immediately.

Remember, your State Inspectors and Headquarters Staff can help you with most issues you may have difficulty completing. A great outline for Quartermasters to follow is the Quartermaster Checklist Guide (Appendix B), found in the new Commander's Program Book on pages 33-35 and online at <u>vfwwi.org</u> in the LOGIN/Members Only section.

Make your efforts as Quartermaster "count" toward improving the overall operation of your Post or District as well as your service to Veterans and the community.

### TIME FOR PATRIOT'S PEN AND VOICE OF DEMOCRACY

August is the time to meet with the schools in your area for Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen entries. The theme for both programs is identical this year: "How Are You Showing Patriotism and Support for Our Country?"

Don't have a school in your area? Reach out to the community. The best way you can do this is to go on the ScholarsApp and download

a poster, which will have a QR code, and post it at your local stores/gas stations. That way the students that qualify (Grades 6-8 for Patriot's Pen and High School for Voice of Democracy), can just scan the QR code and access the application to submit their entry to the Post.



I want to thank all of you who supported this journey. Your collective effort turned a challenge into a proud legacy that will live forever. I'm confident that Mary Ann is smiling down with pride. What a way to finish the year. Thank you once again for a wonderful year, and I look forward to meeting Commander Letto's mission this year so let's "MAKE IT COUNT!"

As I pushed through mile 35 of the grueling Kettle Moraine 100 Miler ultramarathon, somewhere between fatigue and focus, I found myself reflecting deeply on leadership. Out on the trail, stripped of distraction, the parallels between endurance running and effective leadership became very clear. Leading others, much like running an ultramarathon, is not about a burst of brilliance, it's about sustained effort, strategic pacing, and emotional resilience.

In the early miles, everything feels possible. My spirits were high, and the trail was still fresh. It reminded me of the initial phase of any new leadership role: enthusiasm runs high, the vision is clear, and energy fuels momentum. But just like in a race, that early spark can fade quickly. What sustains both runners and leaders is a sense of purpose. Leaders must anchor themselves to the "why," just as runners anchor themselves to the reason they started the race in the first place.

By mile 50, my body began to protest. It was here that self-doubt crept in, a moment familiar to anyone who has led through uncertainty or crisis. I realized that great leadership is not about pretending to be invulnerable; it's about pushing forward even when you're not at your best, and being honest about limitations. Vulnerability on the trail keeps you safe; vulnerability in leadership fosters trust.

Around mile 70, I hit the infamous "wall." It's a space where the mind tries to convince the body to stop. Here, I thought of the importance of mindset in leadership. The best leaders anticipate the wall, prepare


for it, and have strategies to move through it. Be it through support systems, reflection, or sheer grit. Resilience, I learned, is built in moments like these.

Ultramarathons are also rarely won or lost alone. Aid stations, fellow runners, volunteers, all play a role in your success. In leadership, too, no one climbs mountains solo. Listening to others, showing appreciation, and lifting teammates up matter more than any one individual's strength. Empathy and collaboration become critical.

As I neared the final stretch, exhausted yet driven, I thought of how leadership is ultimately a long-distance commitment. It's about showing up day after day, leading with humility, adapting when things get tough, and never losing sight of the end goal. Even when the path is unclear.

Crossing the finish line wasn't just a physical accomplishment. It was a reminder that leadership, like ultrarunning, is a test of endurance, mindset, and heart. And sometimes, the greatest clarity comes not from a meeting room, but from a quiet trail, one foot in front of the other.

consin SSBN 827 will be neld on her "null number date", (827) - August 27, 2025. The ceremony is a private event hosted by General Dynamics Electric Boat at their Quonset Point, RI facility.

The Keel Laying Ceremony symbolizes when the ship begins to transition from design to reality, by marking the formal recognition of the start of a ship's construction. In earlier times, the Keel Laying was the "laying down" of the central or main timber making up the backbone of a vessel. Today, fabrication of a submarine begins many months before some of the ship's lower sections are joined together. However, the Keel Laying Ceremony (also referred to as the Keel Authentication Ceremony), symbolically recognizes the joining of modular components and the ceremonial beginning of construction of a ship.

During the Keel Laying ceremony, the Ship's Sponsor, Dr. Kelly Geurts, will authenticate the keel by chalking her initials onto a metal plate. The initials are then welded onto the plate which is permanently affixed to the ship at which point Dr. Geurts will proclaim the keel to be "truly and fairly laid". A ship's sponsor, by tradition, is a female civilian who is chosen by the Secretary of the Navy to "sponsor" a ship. The sponsor is technically considered a permanent member of the ship's crew and is expected to give a part of her personality to the




## **Supporting NOW in Marshfield**



# **New Dues and Fees Recently Enacted**

The following **two items** were proposed and passed by vote at the **2025 State** Convention:

- A 50¢ per capita (per member) **Newspaper Fee** to the Posts, due to Department by March 1, 2026. This online payment is based on the Post's membership total as of **June 30, 2025**.
- A \$3 increase to Department Annual Membership Dues. This has automatically been updated in OMS, and if a Post's dues were lower than the new total, the total dues for the Post will be automatically increased.

The following item was passed at the June Council of Administration Meeting:

• A \$10 per Delegate increase in Department Convention Delegate Dues. The new Department Delegate dues are now a \$25 flat fee, **plus** a \$15 per Delegate fee. Each Post gets 1 Delegate per 30 members or part thereof.

# Stories From The Final Bridge



This book is the product of a personal legacy project started in the Spring of 2002 to locate the exact burial location of those individuals from Wisconsin who were killed in the Vietnam War. To create a bridge from their name on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, **D.C.**, to their final resting place. Each burial site is recorded on a spreadsheet, including section, row, and column in order to pinpoint the exact location so families, comrades, and friends can easily find our departed heroes. That spreadsheet is archived with, and in use by, the Wisconsin Veterans Museum, The Highground Veterans Memorial, and the Department of Veterans Affairs, among others.

Many of us are familiar with VFW Life Member Steve Conto either through the organization or perhaps his replica Vietnam Wall or this tremendous project. In the author's words:

"My reason for sharing my stories in this book is simple: to remember them and their sacrifice, to let people know about their families, friends and comrades. I've always said, 'It may be fifty years since they left us, but it will always be fifty minutes to those who held them dear.' They should never be forgotten and we must remember the price of our freedom comes at the highest cost. They were just like you and me, with the same hopes, the same dreams, and the same desire for a long life. All tragically taken too soon."

To date, Steve has logged over 20,000 miles, visiting 1,198 burial sites, all over the

country, with 26 more to go. He accepts no monetary support for the project, considering it his great honor to do this work. He states,

"To all the heroes I've searched for, there are no words to express my gratitude in getting to know you, your friends and families. You were Wisconsin's finest and we were blessed to have had you for that short time. We are at a loss to all that was taken from us by your absence. I wish that I never had to say thank you for your ultimate sacrifice."


